Commentary Due to their constant use in palaces and mosques for hundreds of years, only about five hundred Mughal carpets survive today, and these are often in poor condition. Designed and woven in the middle of the seventeenth century, toward the end of the reign of Shah Jahan, this rare fragment depicts seven varieties of plants arranged with no apparent symmetry but not overlapping, in a seemingly spontaneous composition. Although such floral designs are often found on Indian carpets, the monumental scale of each principal flower on this fragment is unique. No other fragments of this carpet are known to have survived.
